Wolverines and Buckeyes

This will be the 114th meeting between Michigan and Ohio State, and the 100th consecutive year that the two

school have met on the football field. The Wolverines have an 58-49-6 advantage in the all-time series. The Buckeyes have won five straight match-up and 12 of the past 13 contests.

Michigan vs. Ohio State in Ann Arbor

The two arch-rivals will meet for the 58th time in Ann Arbor and for the 47th time at Michigan Stadium. U-M has compiled a 31-22-4 record against OSU in Ann Arbor and has a 23-20-3 mark at Michigan Stadium.

Senior Day Recognition

Prior to "The Game" against Ohio State, the University of Michigan will recognize the effort of its fourth- and fifth-year senior football players. A listing of all the senior members of the team can be found on page 5 of the game notes.

'The Game

- Selected as the greatest rivalry in all of sport by ESPN.com in 1999, Michigan and Ohio State will meet for the 100th straight year on the gridiron this Saturday in Ann Arbor
- The two programs have played every year since 1918, a streak that ranks eighth in Division I-A for the longest uninterrupted series
- The overall series dates back to 1897, when the Wolverines claimed a 34-0 victory over the Buckeyes in Ann Arbor

Michigan vs. Ohio State

- This will be the 114th meeting between Michigan and Ohio State
- The Buckeyes are the most common opponent for the Wolverines, trailed closely by Michigan State (110 games)
- The Wolverines hold a 58-49-6 advantage in the all-time series but the Buckeyes have won 12 of the last 13 match-ups
- This will be the third game against OSU as head coach for Jim Harbaugh

U-M vs. OSU at Michigan Stadium

- This will be the 47th meeting between the two archrivals at Michigan Stadium and the 58th all-time meeting in Ann Arbor
- The Wolverines have compiled a 23-20-3 record against the Buckeyes at Michigan Stadium and are 31-22-4 in Ann Arbor
- U-M has claimed victories in eight of the past 14 games at the Big House dating back to 1989
- Michigan defeated Ohio State by a 35-21 score in the 100th renewal of college football's greatest rivalry on Nov. 22, 2003
- Ohio State won the last meeting in Ann Arbor, a 42-13 game in Jim Harbaugh's initial game as head coach in the rival

Televised for the 51st Consecutive Year

- •The annual game will be televised for the 51st consecutive year and 62nd overall time
- Since 1967 every game in the series has been televised, including 31 national television appearances
- This is the first time that FOX will broadcast 'The Game'
- ABC televised the greatest rivalry in sport for 30 consecutive years (1987-2016), with all but the 1995 game being a national television broadcast; the 2005 game was a split national broadcast on ABC and ESPN
- The first game ever televised between the two programs was a 21-0 win by the Wolverines in Ann Arbor during the 1947 national championship season

Wolverines from Ohio

- The Michigan football program has 13 players hailing from the state of Ohio, its largest group of players from a state other than Michigan
- This group includes defensive starters, safety Tyree Kinnel and linebacker Mike McCray, as well as starting long snapper Camaron Cheeseman and punter Brad Robbins
- Linebacker Noah Furbush, punter Will Hart and offensive tackle Nolan Ulizio have also earned starting nods this fall

Michigan in November

- The Wolverines will look to collect their 315th all-time victory during the 11th month of the year at Ohio State this weekend
- U-M has compiled an impressive 314-136-20 all-time record in November
- The Wolverines have a 7-4 mark in the 11th month of the year under coach Jim Harbaugh
- U-M has won 38 of its last 66 contests in November

2017 Michigan Wolverines

- The Wolverines returned six total starters from 2016 (players who made six or more starts)
- U-M had one returning starter on defense, linebacker Mike McCray who started all 13 games during the 2016 season
- Michigan returned four players on the offensive side of the ball, including both fullbacks that split starting duties: LG Ben Bredeson, C Mason Cole, FB Khalid Hill, FB Henry Poggi and QB Wilton Speight
- The Wolverines had one returning specialist from the 2016 season: holder Garrett Moores
- U-M has players from 29 different states and two different countries this season, including 45 players from the state of Michigan, 13 studentathletes from the neighboring state of Ohio and 11 each from Florida and New Jersey
- Michigan welcomed 11 early enrollees to campus in January, the most for the program at the mid-point of the academic calendar

- Heading into 2017, a total 19 players have started at least one game in their career: Ben Bredeson (LG), Ian Bunting (TE), Juwann Bushell-Beatty (LT), Mason Cole (LT/C), Chris Evans (RB), Drake Harris (WR), Khalid Hill (FB), Maurice Hurst (DT), Ty Isaac (RB), Patrick Kugler (LG), Mike McCray (LB), Josh Metellus (S), Bryan Mone (DT), Grant Newsome (LT), John O'Korn (QB), Henry Poggi (FB), Wilton Speight (QB), Maurice Ways (WR) and Chase Winovich (DE)
- Senior Mason Cole leads the team with 49 consecutive starts along the offensive line

Harbaugh in Elite Company

- Jim Harbaugh is one of four Big Ten coaches to win 10-plus games in each of his first two seasons directing a conference school
- Harbaugh joined Fielding Yost (1901-02) as the only head coaches to collected back-to-back 10-win seasons in their first two seasons at U-M
- In addition to Harbaugh and Yost, Ohio State's Urban Meyer (2012-13) and Wisconsin's Paul Chryst (2015-16) also accomplished the feat
- Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903
- Harbaugh has compiled a 28-9 overall record in three seasons at Michigan
- He was a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award in 2016, and was a semifinalist for the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year honor
- Harbaugh is one of 21 coaches who is currently the head coach at his alma mater; Harbaugh, Paul Chryst (Wisconsin) and Pat Fitzgerald (Northwestern) are the only Big Ten coaches to be coaching at their alma mater

Michigan at Home Under Harbaugh

- The Wolverines have compiled a 17-3 home record in three seasons under Jim Harbaugh
- U-M had its 10-game home winning streak snapped against Michigan State (14-10) this year
- The only two previous setbacks of his career came in Big Ten games during the 2015 season, losing to Michigan State and Ohio State
- His teams are a perfect 8-0 in non-conference games, outscoring the opposition by a 318-86 margin in those games
- Michigan has an 9-3 mark in Big Ten games at the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- The Wolverines' football staff boasts an impressive 158 years of playing, coaching and administrative experience at the NFL level
- Michigan has 65 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 38 years of NFL coaching experience and 27 years of playing experience
- Seven of Michigan's 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Pep Hamilton, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Brian Smith and Mike Zordich
- Two of the Wolverines coaches played in the

NFL, with both of those individuals logged more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years) and Mike Zordich (12)

• This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert or the 16 years of experience by head athletic trainer Dave Granito

The Team under Coach Jim Harbaugh

- Michigan posted consecutive 10-win campaigns for the first time since 2002-03
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in top of possession: 9th in 2015 and 15th in 2016
- The Wolverines have committed 224 penalties in 37 games (6.05 per contest); flagged 87 times in 2015, 63 times in 2016 and 74 times this year
- Michigan has scored 150 touchdowns while allowing just 67 to its opponents
- The Wolverine defense has listed in the top five nationally both seasons
- A total of 24 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team) in the past two years, including 16 players in 2016
- Three players earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16) and Jabrill Peppers (2016)
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award

U-M in the Big Ten Conference

- Michigan became the first school in conference history to win 500 games, claiming the milestone win in a 27-20 overtime victory at Indiana
- U-M has compiled a 503-205-18 record all-time in conference play, tops in Big Ten history
- Michigan has a 18-7 mark in Big Ten action under third-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- Harbaugh's only setbacks in the conference came against Michigan State and Ohio State in 2015, Iowa and Ohio State last year and Michigan State, Penn State and Wisconsin this season; four of the seven losses came in top 10 match-ups and four of them came down to the final play
- U-M finished with a 7-2 mark in Big Ten play during the 2016 season; the team's only conference setbacks came on the final play at lowa (FG) and on the final play of the second overtime at Ohio State (TD)

U-M's Offense Under Drevno and Harbaugh

- U-M has posted consecutive 5,000 yard total offensive seasons for the first time since the 2010 and 2011 seasons: 5,147 yards in 2015 and 5,524 in 2016
- The Wolverines have posted 1,221 points in 37 games for an average of 33.0 points per contest; tallied the fifth-highest total in school history last year (524 points) and scored 408 points during the 2015 season
- Scored more points in 2016 than any team in the modern era of U-M football and trailed only the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s
- The red zone offense has converted over 90% in three seasons, 145-160 (90.6%); scored 100 TDs in those 145 conversions (69% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency all three seasons: currently 53rd in the NCAA this season (86.1%) after finishing 13th in 2016 and seventh in 2015
- Averaged over 33 minutes of possession time in each of the three seasons
- Converted 41.2% percent of third down chances (216-524): 32.7% this season, 43% in 2016 and 46% in 2015
- The offense has worked to limit its turnovers on offense: 16 in 2015 (16th nationally), 11 in 2016 (12th nationally) and 14 in 2017
- The Wolverines lost 19 fumbles in 36 games: six in 2015, five in 2016 and eight in 2017
- U-M has scored 91 rushing touchdowns in three seasons: 23 in 2017, 41 in '16 and 27 in '15
- Quarterbacks have tossed 20 or more passing touchdowns in consecutive seasons
- Michigan's quarterbacks have ranked either first or second in completion percentage in the Big Ten: Jake Rudock led the league at 64.0 pct. in 2015 and Wilton Speight with second at 61.6 pct. in 2016
- Rudock and Speight were the third-most efficient passers in the league the past two seasons
- Michigan is a perfect 15-0 under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 23-1 when outrushing the opposition

A Look at the 2017 Offense

- Michigan, Maryland and Houston are the only schools in the country to have three different quarterbacks record a victory this season
- Three running backs have gained more than for 1,100 career yards: Karan Higdon (1,318), Chris Evans (1,208) and Ty Isaac (1,170)
- Michigan has three running backs with 500 rushing yards on the season: Higdon (874), Evans (594) and Isaac (548); this is the first time since 1991 Ricky Powers, Jesse Johnson and Tyrone Wheatley that three running backs have gained 500-plus yards in a season
- U-M has 18 players that have carried the football in a collegiate game
- Eight Wolverines have reached the end zone on the ground, combining to score 50 touchdowns: Karan Higdon (16), Khalid Hill (12), Ty Isaac (8), Chris Evans (10) and one each for Henry Poggi, Kareem Walker, Ben Mason and Wilton Speight
- Mason Cole, Ben Bredeson and Patrick Kugler are the only players on offense to start every

game this fall

- U-M's tight end corps has collected 46 receptions for 616 yards and scored four touchdowns
- Eight players have hauled in receiving scores during their careers: Khalid Hill (3), Grant Perry (3), Kekoa Crawford (2), Zach Gentry (2), Sean McKeon (2), Tarik Black (1), Chris Evans (1), and Tyrone Wheatley (1)
- A total of 19 Wolverines have caught passes during their career
- Wilton Speight, John O'Korn and Brandon Peters have taken snaps under center during the collegiate career, with each of the three players tossing touchdown passes: Speight (22 TDs), Peters (4) and O'Korn (3)
- Khalid Hill was the team's top returning scorer with 13 total trips to the end zone, all during the 2016 season (10 rushing and three receiving)

Grounding out the Yards

- Michigan has gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in a season for the third straight year under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards in 2015, 2,768 in 2016 and 2,136 in 2017
- The Wolverines have carried the ball 460 times for 2,136 yards and scored 23 rushing TDs
- The offense has attempted at least 37 rushing attempts in every game this season
- U-M has produced its best rushing efforts in two of the past four games, gaining a seasonhigh 371 rushing yards vs. Minnesota after rushing for 334 yards vs. Rutgers
- The offense has rushed for over 270 yards in three of the past six Big Ten games
- Michigan has rushed for more than 190 yards six times this season
- The Wolverines have carried the pigskin across the goal line 23 times this season, scoring a season-high four TDs against Rutgers and Minnesota; scored at least one rushing touchdown in 10 of the 11 games

U-M Maintains Balanced Offense

- Michigan has continued to maintain its offensive balance this season, averaging 194.2 yards rushing and 166.2 yards passing
- The Wolverines have gained 3,964 yards on 729 plays this season for an average of 5.4 yards per attempt (360-yard average per contest)
- The offense has gained more than 400 yards of total offense in five games this fall, including two of the past three Big Ten contests: 433 yards vs. Florida (215 rushing, 218 passing), 414 yards vs. Cincinnati (193 rushing, 221 passing), 423 yards at Purdue (139 rushing, 284 passing), 471 vs. Rutgers (334 rushing, 137 passing) and 427 vs. Minnesota (371 rushing, 56 passing)
- Michigan has 23 rushing touchdowns and eight passing scores this season

Red Zone Efficiency

- The Wolverines rank as one of the nation's most efficient teams in the red zone, converting 86.1 percent of their opportunities
- U-M lists 53rd nationally and seventh in the Big Ten this fall, converting 31-of-36 chances (19 touchdowns and 12 field goals)
- The only missed opportunities came on field goal attempts against Florida, Rutgers and

Maryland and a goal-line fumble at Wisconsin; also ended the game with a kneel down against the Terrapins

• Since the start of Big Ten play, Michigan has converted 22-of-26 red zone trips (84.6%) with 18 touchdowns (15 rushing, 3 passing) and four field goals

Possessing the Pigskin

- Michigan is 22nd nationally and third in the Big Ten in time of possession with an average of 32:24 minutes per contest
- The Wolverines won the TOP in seven of the 11 contests this season; edged by Air Force, Minnesota, Maryland and Wisconsin
- U-M dominated the time of possession in four games: 38:59 at Purdue, 36:44 vs. Rutgers, 35:09 at Indiana and 34:13 against Florida

Brandon Peters

- Played in five career games, completing 37-of-64 passes (57.8 pct.) for 486 yards and four touchdowns this season
- Completed 9-of-18 passes for a career-best 157 yards at Wisconsin
- Led five touchdown drives at Maryland, tossing two TDs on 9-of-18 passing for 145 yards
- Made first career start vs. Minnesota, completing 8-of-13 passes for 56 yards and one TD
- Saw first substantial playing time vs. Rutgers, completing 10-of-14 passes for 124 yards and one touchdown; completed passes to nine different receivers
- Tossed his first career touchdown pass to Chris Evans for 20 yards in the second quarter vs. RU
- Led touchdown drives on his first four series vs.
 Rutgers; six straight possessions finished in the Scarlet Knights territory
- Made career debut at Purdue, completing a four-yard pass
- Did not see game action as a freshman in 2016

Wilton Speight

- Played in 23 career games and made 16 starts at guarterback
- Missed seven Big Ten games due to injury
- Started the first four games of the 2017 season, completing 44-of-81 passes for 581 yards and three touchdowns
- Tossed a pair of touchdowns vs. Cincinnati, completing 17-of-29 passes for 221 yards
- Started opener against Florida, completing 11-of-25 passes for 181 yards and one TD
- Selected as the team's 2016 Most Improved Player by the coaching staff
- 2016 All-Big Ten third team as selected by both the coaches and media; semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award
- Won the first nine starts of his career before suffering his first defeat at lowa
- Completed 204-of-331 passes for 2,538 yards with 18 TDs and seven interceptions in 2016
- Lists 10th in Michigan's season records for attempts, completions and yards while listing tied for 13th in touchdowns
- Led 66 scoring drives in 144 possessions during the 2016 season; directed 50 touchdown drives and 16 field goal drives

- Engineered 13 touchdown drives of 80 yards or more in 2016, including drives of 98, 91 (three times), 84, 83, 81 and 80 (six times) yards
- Tossed a TD pass in 10 of 12 starts in 2016

Michigan's Defense under Harbaugh

- Don Brown has led the nation's No. 1 ranked defense the past two-plus seasons: 2016 at Michigan and 2015 at Boston College
- The pass defense has been the nation's best the past two seasons: No. 3 in 2015 and No. 1 in 2016
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015 and finished second in 2016
- Michigan has finished in the top four in total defense in consecutive seasons: No. 4 in 2015 and No. 1 in 2016
- The Wolverines have held 16 of their 36 opponents to 10 points or less in three seasons, including four shutouts; only 12 teams have managed to score more than 20 points vs. U-M
- U-M has scored seven defensive touchdowns: 1 in 2015, 3 in 2016 and 3 in 2017
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards in 21 of the 37 games
- The Wolverines have posted 305 tackles for loss in 37 games (8.24 avg. per game); 96 in 2017, 121 in 2016 and 88 in 2015
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 114 times (3.1 avg.): 36 in 2017, 46 in 2016 and 32 in 2015

U-M's Defense One of the Nation's Best

- U-M lists in the top 15 nationally of 10 defensive categories; including seven where the team lists in the top eight
- The defense leads the Big Ten in four categories and is second in three additional categories
- The Wolverines lead the nation in third down defense (24.7 pct.) and pass defense (144.4 avg.)
- The defense ranks third in the NCAA in total defense (261.2 avg.) and first downs allowed (149 total)
- U-M is fourth nationally in pass efficiency defense (97.43 rating)
- Michigan lists in the top 10 of the NCAA rankings in tackles for loss (seventh, 8.4 avg.) and sacks (eighth, 3.3 avg.)
- The defense has held five opponents to less than 200 yards of total offense: 192 vs. Florida, 200 vs. Cincinnati, 189 at Purdue, 195 vs. Rutgers and 164 vs. Minnesota
- Eight Wolverine defenders have 40 or more stops this season; three of those players are defensive linemen
- Michigan has four players with double-digit TFLs and six total players with eight (8) or more tackles for loss this season: Khaleke Hudson, Chase Winovich, Maurice Hurst, Mike McCray, Devin Bush and Rashan Gary
- Five Wolverines have collected five or more sacks this fall, led by defensive end Chase Winovich and viper/linebacker Khaleke Hudson with seven each
- Michigan posted a season high 13 tackles for loss against Minnesota
- A total of 18 players have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield with 11 of those Wolverines collecting sacks
- The only returning starter on U-M's defense was fifth-year senior linebacker Mike McCray
- The team has five players that logged starting assignments during their careers prior to the 2017 season: McCray, Maurice Hurst, Josh

Metellus, Bryan Mone and Chase Winovich

- Six players on the defense have recorded interceptions, with McCray, Tyree Kinnel, Lavert Hill, Hudson and David Long each collecting two apiece; McCray, Kinnel and Hill have returned interceptions for touchdowns
- Twenty-one (21) Wolverines have recorded tackles in the opposition's backfield, led by Maurice Hurst (33.5), Chase Winovich (26.5), Mike McCray (23.5), Khaleke Hudson (15.5) and Rashan Gary (13.5); the 21 players have combined to post 133 TFLs
- Twelve (12) U-M players have registered quarterback sacks in their career, led by Winovich (13), Hurst (13), McCray (7.5), Devin Bush (5), Hudson (6) and Gary (4)
- McCray (9), Hill (9), Bush (8), Hudson (8), Kinnel (8), Watson (5), Long (4), Metellus (3), Hurst (2), Noah Furbush (1), Jordan Glasgow (1) and Mone (1) have tallied pass breakups in their careers
- Gary, Hurst, Winovich, Bush, Hill, Metellus, Kinnel and Long have started every game this season for the defense with Hudson and McCray earning the nod in all but one game

Michigan Stopping the Run

- The Wolverines are 15th nationally and fifth in the Big Ten in rushing defense, yielding 116.8 yards per contest
- U-M has allowed just 1,285 yards on 377 carries (3.4 avg.) with 12 rushing touchdowns
- The Wolverines have held six opponents to less than 100 rushing yards this season
- The defense held Florida to just 11 rushing yards and allowed only 20 yards to Purdue

Wolverines' Lead the NCAA in Pass Defense

- For the second straight season, U-M is leading the NCAA in pass defense, allowing just 144.4 yards through the air this season
- Michigan has held three opponents to less than 100 passing yards and yielded just 101 yards threw the air to Rutgers
- The defense has allowed only eight passing touchdowns all season with no team earning more than one through the air against U-M
- The Wolverines have batted down 50 passes by the opposition, including eight interceptions
- Lavert Hill leads the team with nine pass breakups; 11 different players have collected at least one PBU

Michigan Third Nationally in Total Defense

- Michigan is third in the NCAA in total defense, allowing the opposition to gain just 261.2 yards per contest
- U-M has held five of opponents to less than 200 yards of total offense: Florida (192), Cincinnati (200), Purdue (189), Rutgers (195) and Minnesota (164)
- Penn State (506 yards), Maryland (340) and Wisconsin (325) are the only teams to gain more than 280 yards of total offense against Michigan's defense this fall
- Overall, U-M has yielded just 2,873 yards on 658 plays by the opposition (4.37 avg.) with 20 touchdowns
- The defense has forced the opposition into a

NCAA-leading 83 punts this fall

- Six of the 10 opponents had their lowest yardage totals of the season against Michigan
- U-M is third in the Big Ten in conference play, allowing just 281.1 yards per contest

Defense Not Yielding Points

- The Wolverines are third in the Big Ten and 11th nationally in scoring defense, yielding 17.1 points per contest
- U-M has held seven of its 10 opponents to 14 points or fewer this fall
- The opposition has scored just 20 touchdowns this fall, with U-M allowing 12 rushing touchdowns and eight passing scores
- The defense has contributed to the team's scoring output with 21 points on three defensive TDs (two interceptions and one fumble recovery); ranks 14th nationally in defensive TDs
- U-M's defense has allowed just 167 points by the opposition: 20 TDs and 9 FGs
- Six teams scored multiple touchdowns against the defense; Penn State scored a season-high six touchdowns against Michigan
- Michigan's defense has held 10 straight opponents to 14 points or less at Michigan Stadium, which is the longest active streak in the NCAA

Defense Stingy in Second Half

- U-M has been a dominant defensive unit in the second half this season, allowing the opposition just 87 total points in 22 quarters of action
- The defense held its first two Big Ten opponents scoreless in the second half before yielding any points in the final 30 minutes
- The Hoosiers became the first team to score in the fourth quarter against the Wolverines, reaching the end zone on a passing touchdown and field goal at the buzzer to force overtime
- U-M has yielded just 37 points in the fourth stanza, the lowest point total allowed in any of the four quarters this season
- Michigan has allowed 1,357 yards on 337 plays in the second half (average of 4.0 yards per play)
- U-M has held five opponents to less than 100 yards in the second half, including just 10 yards to Purdue and 36 yards to Minnesota

U-M Second Nationally in Force 3-and-outs

- For the second straight season, U-M has been the nation's best at forcing three-and-outs by the opposition's offense
- U-M is second in the NCAA averaging 6.36 three-and-outs per contests which is just behind Indiana (6.64 avg.)
- The defense has forced 70 three-and-outs in 134 opponent possessions this fall (52.2 pct.)
- In Big Ten play, the Wolverines forced 51 threeand-outs: 7 at Wisconsin, 4 at Maryland, 5 vs. Minnesota, 6 vs. Rutgers, 2 at Penn State, 8 at Indiana, 9 vs. Michigan State and 10 at Purdue
- The defense has forced 44 three-and-outs in 76 possessions (56.4 pct.) in the second half: 4-8 at Wisconsin, 2-5 at Maryland, 3-6 vs. Rutgers and Minnesota, 1-5 at Penn State, 6-10 at Indiana, 6-8 vs. MSU, 5-6 at PU, 5-7 vs Air Force, 5-8 vs. Cincinnati and 4-7 vs. Florida

Nation's Best Defense on Third Down

- Michigan leads the NCAA in third down defense this season; set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down
- This season, the defense has allowed its opponents to convert just 24.7 percent of its third down chances (37-150)
- Six opponents have converted three or less third down opportunities this fall: Florida (2-13), Air Force (3-13), Purdue (0-12), Michigan State (2-14), Rutgers (3-11) and Maryland (3-16)
- The Wolverines held the Boilermakers without a third down conversion (0-12)
- No team has converted more than six third-down chances against the Wolverines and second-year defensive coordinator Don Brown
 U-M has held eight opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past two seasons, including Florida, Purdue and Michigan State this year

Defense Playing in the Opposition's Backfield

- The Wolverines have spent a lot of time in the opposition's backfield this fall, racking up 93 tackles for loss and 36 sacks
- Michigan is eighth nationally in sacks (3.27 avg.) and lists seventh in the NCAA in tackles for loss with an average of 8.4 per contest
- U-M has recorded six or more TFLs in every game this season, posting a season-high 13 against Minnesota: Florida (11), Cincinnati (7), Air Force (9), Purdue (7), Michigan State (6), Indiana (7), Penn State (7), Rutgers (11), Minnesota (13), Maryland (7), Wisconsin (8)
- Eighteen (18) different players have accounted for a tackle for loss while 11 Wolverines have sacked the quarterback
- Khaleke Hudson (16) leads the Big Ten in TFLs while Chase Winovich (15.5) lists second
- Hudson is pacing the conference in sacks with Winovich listing fifth in that category
- Michigan recorded a season-high six sacks against Florida and dropped the quarterback five times in conference games against Purdue, Rutgers and Minnesota

Forcing Miscues by the Opposition

- The defense has forced 14 turnovers this season, nine interceptions and five fumbles
- Eight different players have forced fumbles this fall with the Wolverines recovering five of the opponent's mistakes
- The defense forced four fumbles by Florida with two recoveries; the third recovery came on kickoff coverage by Ambry Thomas
- The first defensive points of the season were registered by Noah Furbush, who fell on a loose football in the end zone following Chase Winovich's sack and strip of Malik Zaire
- Tyree Kinnel and Lavert Hill lead the team with two interceptions apiece
- Kinnel and Hill returned interceptions for touchdowns against Cincinnati, with Kinnel returning his pick for 28 yards in the first quarter and Hill weaving his way for a 24-yard TD during the fourth quarter

- This season, the Wolverines are joined by North Carolina wearing the Jordan brand and next season the University of Oklahoma will be outfitted by Jordan
- Jordan is outfitting the Michigan team from head-totoe on all apparel needs for the football program
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year apparel agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

RECAPPING THE 2016 SEASON

- U-M finished 10th in both final national polls, earning its first top 10 finish since 2006 (No. 8 in AP, No. 9 in coaches)
- The Wolverines finished with their second straight 10-win season, the 28th time in the 137-year history of the program that a squad reach double-digits in victories
- U-M's three losses by a combined five points came on the final play in road games at lowa (14-13) and Ohio State (30-27 in two overtimes) and with 36 seconds remaining against Florida State (33-32) in the Orange Bowl
- Michigan finished the season as the NCAA leader in total defense (261.8 avg.), pass defense (142.5 avg.), first downs allowed (186 total) and third down defense (21.0 pct.)
- U-M also finished second nationally in scoring defense (14.1 avg.), pass efficiency (94.19 rating) and tackles for losse (9.3 avg.)



A Legendary Rivalry in College Football

In a series that dates back to 1897, Michigan and Ohio State have met on the gridiron 113 times, ranking it tied for 14th among Division I-A most played rivalries. The Buckeyes and Wolverines have played every year since 1918, a 100-year streak which is tied for eighth in NCAA Division I-A for longest uninterrupted series.

Since the game was moved to the final Saturday of the Big Ten season in 1935, the game has had the potential for major impact in the Big Ten standings 44 times. This includes 22 contests where the two schools decided the Big Ten champion between themselves. Every season from 1972-81, the Michigan-Ohio State game determined which team would take a New Year's trip to Pasadena.

While Michigan holds a 58-49-6 edge over Ohio State in the series, with Ohio State leading the series, 49-46-4, since 1918. This includes a 21-26-1 Michigan record at Ohio Stadium, where the Wolverines played and won the dedication game in 1922, and a 23-20-3 Michigan lead at Michigan Stadium, where the Buckeyes were invited for the dedication game in

Since 1927, the teams have been so evenly matched that neither one has compiled anything longer

Since the Ohio Stadium dedication game in 1922, 8,295,743 fans have seen the Wolverines and Buckeyes meet on the gridiron. Sixty-seven of those 95 games have been sold out, including the last 48 in a row. Since 1922, more people have attended Michigan-Ohio State games than any other gridiron matchup in the country.

MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- U-M led all schools with 11 players selected during the 2017 NFL Draft.
- The Wolverines had a school record 14 players attend the 2017 NFL Scouting Combine.
- All 19 Wolverines that worked out at the school's pro day were signed to NFL contracts (11 draftees and eight free agents).
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 79 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen.
- There are four Wolverines that were selected in the first round of the NFL Draft still active in the league: CB Leon Hall, DE Brandon Graham, OT Taylor Lewan and S Jabrill Peppers.
- Since the inaugural draft in 1938, a total of 362 Michigan players have been selected.
- A total of 52 players have been chosen in the first round of the draft (AAFC, AFL and NFL).
- Tom Harmon (1941) and Jake Long (2008) were the first overall picks in the NFL Draft.

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2016 (90 Years)

The football program is in its 90th season in the "Big House" in 2016, with a 424-128-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capcity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 278 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators.

Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0. **REDEDICATION GAME:** September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 49,644,850 fans have watched the Wolverines play 567 games. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 278 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh is in his third season as the J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach at the University of Michigan. Named the 20th coach in U-M football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30, 2014, Harbaugh became the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Jim Harbaugh is one of four Big Ten coaches to win 10-plus games in each of his first two seasons directing a conference school. Harbaugh joined Fielding Yost (1901-02) as the only head coaches to collected back-to-back 10-win seasons in their first two seasons at U-M. In addition to Harbaugh and Yost, Ohio State's Urban Meyer (2012-13) and Wisconsin's Paul Chryst (2015-16) also accomplished the feat.

Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903.

In his first year, Michigan finished with a 10-3 record, including a 41-7 win over No. 19 Florida in the 2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl. The Wolverines finished in the top 12 of the national polls for the first time since 2011, ranking 11th in the Amway Coaches poll and 12th in the Associated Press media poll.

In 2017, the Wolverines took another step forward, coming within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division title and a spot in the conference championship game. U-M finished 10-3 and listed 10th in both polls at year's end.

Harbaugh has coached U-M players to five first-team All-America honors; back-to-back honors for Jake Butt and Jourdan Lewis and consensus accolades for Jabrill Peppers in 2016. Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end and Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy.

A total of 21 players have earned all-conference recognition in both seasons. Harbaugh's 2016 team set a program record with 23 Academic All-Big Ten honors.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League

with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular-season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved in each of Harbaugh's four

seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, in the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls, and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular-season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

Harbaugh began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. He spent eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA national championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years. Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top 12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister,

Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.
