AGRICULTURE RISK COVERAGE PAYMENTS

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue today announced that over \$9.6 billion in payments will be made, beginning this week, to producers through the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC), Price Loss Coverage (PLC) and Conservation Reserve (CRP) programs. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is issuing approximately \$8 billion in payments under the ARC and PLC programs for the 2016 crop year, and \$1.6 billion under CRP for 2017. "Many of these payments will be made to landowners and producers in rural communities that have recently been ravaged by drought, wildfires, and deadly hurricanes," Perdue said. "I am hopeful this financial assistance will help those experiencing losses with immediate cash flow needs as we head toward the end of the year." The ARC and PLC programs were authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill and offer a safety net to agricultural producers when there is a substantial drop in revenue or prices for covered commodities. Over half a million producers will receive ARC payments and over a quarter million producers will receive PLC payments for 2016 crops, starting this week and continuing over the next several months.

ADRIAN SMITH RELEASES STATEMENT

Congressman Adrian Smith (R-NE) released the following statement Wednesday after voting in the Ways and Means Committee to pass H.R. 849, the Protecting Seniors' Access to Medicare Act, to repeal the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB). IPAB is an unelected 15-member panel created under Obamacare to cut Medicare costs. This board would have the power to limit access to medical treatments by reducing reimbursements for disfavored procedures, threatening the ability of physicians to provide these procedures and even to continue seeing Medicare patients. "Our country was built on the separation of powers, but the consolidated, unchecked authority of Obamacare's IPAB is a dangerous rejection of this wisdom," Smith said. "We need to reform Medicare through the legislative process to provide greater accountability for doctors and patients in their decision-making; we should not rely on arbitrary cuts made by panel of unelected bureaucrats.

Win or lose, McCook will have another game at 5:30 p.m. The tournament continues tomorrow with games starting at 10 a.m. The Bison boys tennis team hosts North Platte in their final home match of the season today at the Bison and Elks Tennis Courts. The Lady Bison volleyball team heads to Lexington for a triangular with the Minutemaids and Gothenburg. The Bison cross country teams are in Minden for the Southwest Conference Invite.

The fourth-ranked Nebraska volleyball team continued its impressive run through the beginning of its Big Ten schedule with a 3-1 (25-19, 25-15, 22-25, 25-19) win over No. 14 Michigan State on Wednesday night in front of 8,406 spectators at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. With the win, the Huskers (12-3, 5-0 Big Ten) took over sole possession of first place in the Big Ten standings a quarter of the way through the conference season. Michigan State, the only other unbeaten team in Big Ten play entering the night, dropped to 11-3 overall and 4-1 in conference play. The Huskers won their sixth match in a row and their sixth straight match against a top-15 opponent, matching the most consecutive wins by NU against top-15 teams in a season since 2006.
