#### Foreword

The 2019/2020 school year presented a set of challenges to the Jamestown Public School District that nobody could have reasonably foreseen. We were forced due to a COVID 19 pandemic, by government order, to close schools in March and transition to solely virtual learning opportunities. Our teachers and district needed to quickly pivot to this new environment and maintain a high-quality educational experience for our students. I could not be more proud of the work that our district, our teachers, and our support staff did to maintain the best possible outcomes amidst very challenging circumstances.

While the 2019/2020 school year was wrought with challenges, it is now up to our district and our amazing staff to take those lessons learned to consider how we can best learn from these experiences. Prior to the pandemic, for example, the Jamestown School Board had just approved the implementation of a learning management system (LMS). With the necessity of using these types of platforms for virtual learning, our district and staff had many experiences (both good and not so good) that shaped our understanding of fully implementing and utilizing a Learning Management System. In essence, the spring of 2020 built our collective capacity in a way that would have taken years. As a district, we need to capitalize on these experiences to continue to raise the bar for our district.

As a district, however, we must realize that the pandemic also created challenges for the district, students, and for families that we must work diligently to mitigate. In our community, we see increasing poverty, we have concerns with a learning gap resulting from the loss of face-to-face instruction in the spring of 2020, the district needs to consider how to balance academic needs with the safety needs of re-opening schools to face-to-face instruction, and a myriad other challenges. Our 2020/2021 school year and likely beyond will need to continue to assess the needs of our students resulting from this snapshot in time.

As you peruse the Superintendent's Annual Report, you may notice some inconsistencies from previous years. Again, this is mostly the result of the pandemic. For example, North Dakota did not conduct the North Dakota State Assessment this past year, so we will have incomplete data related to assessment. Additionally, our financial trends are not as consistent as they would be in a typical year. We had unbudgeted expenses, such as providing connectivity for families in need to participate in virtual learning, loss of revenue, such as our food service program, an influx of federal funds, and even a decrease in some expenditures due to the school closure. It is important to also note that we continued to pay all staff and negotiated fair compensation for contracted services as requested by Governor Burgum.

I am proud of our school district from our school board to staff for the work done in this most challenging year. We continue to be future-focused and guided by an ambitious strategic plan. I look forward to continuing the process to improve the Jamestown School District and maintain our status as a school district of choice.

## AMERICAN COLLEGE TEST (ACT)

The ACT Assessment is designed to assess high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work. The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, Mathematics, Reading and Science designed to measure the skills needed for success in first year college course work. The ACT test is America's most widely accepted college entrance exam. A perfect score is a 36.

While students will pursue a variety of paths after high school, all students should be prepared for college and work. Through collaborative research with postsecondary institutions nationwide. ACT has established the following as college readiness benchmark scores for designated college courses: English Composition: 18 on ACT English Test: Algebra: 22 on ACT Math Test: Social Studies: 22 on ACT Reading Test: and Biology: 23 on ACT Science Test. A benchmark score is the minimum score needed on an ACT subject-area test to indicate a 50% chance of obtaining a B or higher or about 75% chance of obtaining a C or higher in the corresponding credit-bearing college courses.

# **Striving Readers Grant and Comprehensive State Literacy Development Grants**

The Jamestown School District has recognized that literacy and writing are areas of development across the district. To help better support our staff and students in these targeted improvement areas, two grants, the Striving Readers Comprehensive Literacy (SRCL) grant and the Comprehensive Literacy State Development (CLSD) grants were written and received.

On July 23, 2018, the Jamestown School District received the North Dakota SRCL grant in the amount of \$1,246,376.13 through November 30, 2021. The purpose of this grant is to improve community literacy in children and students in the community of Jamestown across the Birth to Grade 12 continuum.

The grant requires allocations and expenditure percentages of those funds across age levels to ensure an equitable distribution of activities and services to all age levels. This includes 15% for Birth to Age 5, 40% in Elementary, 20% for Middle School, 20% for High School and an additional 5% allocation to Administrative Costs.

As a result of the SRCL grant, the district has been able to expand on effective initiatives that support growth in literacy, such as instructional coaching and Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) frameworks. SRCL also allowed for the adoption of new initiatives, such as the development of Professional Learning Communities. Further, the district undertook a Literacy Audit to better assess and implement impactful changes to literacy in the district. Lastly, this grant allowed the district to build capacity and bridges to childcares, families, and Pre-K programs to better prepare students for Kindergarten.

With the recognition that the work of the SRCL would need to be extended, the Jamestown School District also wrote and received the CLSD grant. On April 15, 2020, the district was notified of the grant award of \$1.25 million through June 30, 2025 to continue this important work in literacy.



# CENTRAL VALLEY HEALTH UNIT May 2020

Central Valley Health District is contracted to provide school nursing to Jamestown Public Schools below if a summary of the 2019 services that were provided. In February 2020 long time school nurse and CVHD employee Angie Allmer, resigned. Plans for replacement for the school nurse position were made by CVHD and JPS. The replacement plans include hiring a new nurse to start in the fall of 2020. CVHD would cut back in nursing services starting in March 2020 and payments to CVHD would be reduced due to the changes in staff and staff time at JPS. In March 2020 a novel virus called COVID 19 reached pandemic proportions and impacted North Dakota. In March 2020 schools were shifted to distance learning and school visits ended.

The following data shows school nursing numbers for all of the calendar year 2019. Numbers for 2020 will reflect the months of January and February along with school in the Fall of 2020 in the next report for May 2021. Total school nursing services for both counties serviced by CVHD: 3,010 in 2018 and decreased in 2019 to 2,603. (Numbers below are Stutsman County only)



Each fall, school screening and in-school flu vaccine clinics continue to be an intense focus for the school nurse. This process continues to be adjusted and streamlined. We have implemented a mobile vision screening tool, Plusoptix. This non-invasive screening tool has helped detect vision abnormalities more thoroughly than using standard eye chart testing alone. Vison screening can be performed on any child because the only compliance needed is a short fixation on the camera. In addition to Central Valley Nursing staff serving the schools, the University of Jamestown Nursing students have a strong presence in each of the public schools during the fall semester of the school year.

The CVHD staff works very closely with the secretarial staffs to ensure that each student complies with the current immunization requirements. Work with the IT and secretarial staff at the schools has led to including the student's health and immunization records on the Power School program.

The school nurse link on the Jamestown Public School website continues to be an avenue to disperse pertinent health information on immunizations, communicable diseases and other health related issues for students and parents. This has been implemented into the Kindergarten Registration process as a resource for new parents. Collaboration with school staff to put out information on school websites and use of the school mobile app has also been of great benefit in this community.

Growth and Development is presented to Grades 4, 5, and 6 grades depending on the schools. This was done in the Fall of 2019.

Central Valley Health District nurses provided influenza vaccinations at all schools located in Stutsman and Logan counties. School flu shots administered <u>increased</u> from **810** in 2018 to **826** in 2019.

Central Valley Health District continues to envision the goal of providing school nursing to the schools within our service area.

#### **GENERAL FUND**

The general fund records revenues and expenditures in the operational fund of the day-to-day activities of the school district. The primary revenue source is state foundation aid. The largest expenditures are in staff salaries and benefits. For 2019-2020, the general fund recorded \$29,347,603.03 in revenues and \$29,347,603.03 in expenditures. The ending fund balance in the general fund as of June 30, 2020 was \$3,201,704.06. The ending fund balance represents 10.9 percent of total expenditures. The COVI9 Pandemic affected all areas of the school district. The school closed on March 16<sup>th</sup> and remote learning was done through the end of the year.

#### SPECIAL RESERVE FUND

The county auditor managed the Special Reserve Fund until 1997 when legislation was passed to transfer the funds over to the school district. Up to 50% of the balance can be transferred if deficit spending occurs in the general fund. There was no transfer of monies from special reserve to the general fund for the 2019-2020 school year.

#### **BUILDING FUND**

The Building Fund notes expenditures associated with miscellaneous repair projects such as painting, carpeting, lights, major roof repairs, etc. associated with normal care of facilities. one mill is being levied for special assessments.

During the summer of 2020 the major items were: boiler replacement at Lincoln Elementary, roof repairs at all schools and remodel of the Transition House (previously Jamestown North). Our school system is in compliance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHEA) The Institute for Environmental Assessment from Brooklyn Park, Minnesota provides asbestos consulting services to the school district and performs our three- year inspection.

#### DEBT SERVICE FUND

The current remaining debt for the school district consists of the enhancements that had been made to Ernie Gates Field in 2008, which included lights, bleachers, and press box and the Green Space located near the Middle School. In addition, the District has an Energy Savings Performance Maintenance debt.

#### FOOD SERVICE DEPT. – NUTRITION REPORT 2019-2020

All employees received a 7 % pay increase. There was 30 foodservice employees.

Lunch prices were increased according to the Federal Rule of Equity – section 205 of the Healthy Hunger Act. Elementary prices were \$60.00 per month or \$3.00 per meal. Secondary prices were: Middle School \$61.00 per month or \$3.05 per meal. High School \$62.00 per month or \$3.10 per meal. Reduced lunches \$.40. Adult lunch was \$3.85. Breakfast \$1.80 for elementary and \$1.95 for secondary. **Reduced breakfasts were \$.0.** Adult breakfasts were \$2.40. All adult meals must be .75 higher than the highest student paid lunch per Federal Rule of Equity.

Unpaid student balances in the JPS school lunch program totaled **\$1016.98**. Total NSF covered by foodservice for the year was \$0. Food Service has taken accounts to collections when the balance owed was over \$100.00. The Collection total is \$507.42. Our current procedures working as a team; Cashiers, Food Service Director, Counsellors and Principals has been wonderfully effective in reducing overall unpaid school meal balances.

Once again the Federal Government subsidized the program both financially and with commodities. Reimbursement rates were \$.39 for full priced meals, \$3.08 for reduced priced meals and \$3.48 free priced meals. Reimbursement rates for breakfasts were \$.31 for full priced, \$1.54 reduced and \$1.84 free.

The value of brown box commodities received was \$64,559.60. Jamestown Public School spent total of \$11,984.76 this year with NOI (net off invoice) the commodity program available thru USDA/Distributors. A govt. program called (DOD) that allow schools to use their entitlement dollars to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables thru a distributor totaled \$17,257.30 dollars. Overall government Entitlement Spent-- \$93,801.66.

During the **125** school days, 198,081 reimbursable **student lunches** was served, 573,78 were free, 15,562 were reduced priced and 125,141 were full priced.

There were 4,495 adult free lunches--for foodservice employees, principals, secretaries and teachers who supervise students in the cafeteria and 3,283 paid adult lunches.

During **125** school days, 43,171 reimbursable **breakfasts was** served at all schools. Of the total, 22,506 were free, 4928 were reduced and 15,737 were full priced. There were 96 paid adult breakfasts and 0 free adult breakfasts. Three schools qualified for the severe need rate at breakfast. (40% of the lunches served 2 years previous were claimed at the free or reduced price rate.) Those reimbursements rates were \$.31 for full priced, \$2.20 for free priced and \$1.90 for reduced priced.

The High School satellites 91 to 100 total daily lunches to Washington Elementary School.

All meals considered; reimbursable and adult, an average of 346 breakfasts are served per day and 1,647 lunches per day to bring the total to 1,993 meals per day.

An observable stat to mention is 15 more lunches was served daily over the district this year. 8 more breakfast meals daily served in the district this year. This was figured as avg/per day.

All reduced students received a free federal breakfast this year.

2012- 59% 2013- 51% 2014-53% 2015-51%, 2016- 51% & 2017-51% of meals served at **breakfast** were free. In 2018 – 53% of meals served at breakfast were free. 2019 – 52% of meals served were free. 2020 based on **125 days** – 52%.

2012-31% 2013- 27% 2014-29% 2015- 28%, 2016-28 % & 2017-28% of **meals served at lunch** were free. In 2018 -27% of meals served at lunch was free. In 2019 – 28% of the meals served were free. In 2019-2020 based on **125 days**– 29% of lunch meals was free.

All day Kindergarten students receive milk at a cost of \$.35 daily for snack break or \$7.00 per month.

Pre-school students qualify for a federally funded milk program. The cost was \$.15 daily or \$2.40 per month. They have the option to qualify for breakfast and lunch.

Three elementary schools served after school snacks. Reimbursement rates were \$.08 for full priced snacks, \$.47 for reduced priced snacks, and \$.94 free priced snacks. 152 students participated daily.

Five elementary schools were the recipient of the USDA Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Grant. This program serves a morning or afternoon snack of fresh fruit and vegetable. Lincoln received \$11,600, Louis L'Amour received \$5,300, Roosevelt received \$11,200, Washington received \$5,450 and Gussner received \$12,950.00. Total dollar amt. \$46,500.00.

Locally grown produce was purchased from 1 family farm (Moser's) Forager's Farms from Streeter. Fresh produce is used for school lunch salad bars and for use in the fresh fruit and vegetable program. A total of \$1054.76 was spent for locally grown fruits and vegetables. Students from the Summer School Century 21 Program, local master gardeners and staff from the local extension service will not be caring for the Washington school garden due to the Covid-19 pandemic school guidelines.

During the time of school closures due to the Covid-19 Pandemic Jamestown Public Schools received guidance and applied for an expanded feeding program through USDA — Child Nutrition and Food Distribution Office. **Free** Breakfast and Lunches, grab-go style was provided to students at 5 school sites. School Lunch Program offered deliveries as well as had an on-line ordering system.

Reimbursement rates for breakfast meals was \$2.375 and lunch meals at \$4.1525. Starting Meals on March 19<sup>th</sup> thru end of April with 5 school sites open with approx. ½ of our staff -8,300 breakfasts and 8,538 grab and go lunches was served.

May 1<sup>st</sup> thru the 22<sup>nd</sup> last day of school continuing with 5 sites open served 6,375 lunches and 6,308 breakfasts.

On May 26<sup>th</sup> received guidance from Department of Public Instruction that Food Service could continue serving meals thru June 30<sup>th</sup>. Food Service Department decided to serve meals from only 1 site - the Middle School with approx. ¼ staff.

The School Lunch Program from the Middle School site will also serve free grab – go meals to summer school students at the Middle School, Gussner Elementary and The Most Program at Washington School.

Those numbers are **pending.**

#### HEALTH INSURANCE FUND

A self-funded health plan is the current health plan in place at Jamestown Public Schools. The health plan is self-funded and is called Classic Blue 250 and is administered by Blue Cross Blue Shield. The ending balance as of June 30, 2020 is \$1,179,295. Through negotiations, a health committee was formed. In essence, the school board agreed to support the health insurance fund with \$2,500,000.00 in 2019-2020. The committee agreed to maintain a reserve which has been modified to be based on the accrual from our consultants times the number of members (September payroll) times four (4 months) which amounts to \$1,275,476. In 2019-2020 this left a shortfall of \$96,181.65. Shortfalls are made up by participants and school board being assessed a fee. Per the negotiated agreement the split of the deficit is 60% members and 40% school board.

Our consultants worked with medical providers over the previous 18 months to contract with a clinic to bring services to the employees choosing our health insurance plan and the community of Jamestown. Working with our consultants the District contracted with Medallus Clinic out of Utah and on March 19<sup>th</sup>, 2018 opened a clinic located on main street. The clinic is open expanded hours and appointment scheduling available to employees on the health insurance plan with no co-pay.

## INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES EDUCATION ACT (IDEA)

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004 (IDEA) focuses on providing students with disabilities a free and appropriate public education (FAPE). IDEA states that all children with disabilities between the ages of 3 and 21 shall receive, if educationally necessary, special education and related services designed to meet the individual needs of the student. Students suspected of having a disability receive an evaluation, with parent consent, to determine eligibility for special education services. If eligible, an individual education program (IEP) is written for the student that defines goals and services necessary for the student to receive a free and appropriate public education. Programming decisions are made through a team process. Teams are comprised of parent(s), general education teacher(s), special education teacher(s), and administrator and others necessary to make decisions for programming for the individual student.

#### JAMES RIVER SPECIAL EDUCATION COOPERATIVE FOR 2019-2020

Jamestown Special Education Unit is a part of James River Special Education Cooperative (JRSEC), an entity that serves students with disabilities in the following school districts: Edgeley, Ellendale, Kulm, Jamestown, LaMoure, Litchville-Marion, Medina and Montpelier. Jamestown cooperates with the other seven districts belonging to the cooperative, in the sharing of administrative staff, school psychologists, occupational therapists, speech-language pathologists and teaching staff. The Jamestown Public School Board is the operating board for the Jamestown Special Education Unit.

James River Special Education Cooperative provides a full continuum of service options. Options range from students being served full time in the general education classroom to students being served in other facilities. Some students are served in private facilities or are placed by cooperating agencies in facilities such as Anne Carlsen Center, short term psychiatric treatment centers, Youth Correction Center in Mandan, Life Skills Transition Center in Grafton, Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch in Minot, Fargo and/or Bismarck, and Manchester House in Bismarck. Most placements are in North Dakota but out-of-state placements are also considered when necessary.

In an effort to continue to develop a pool of credentialed, high quality special educators available to serve students with disabilities, the cooperative continues to recruit special education teachers, speech language pathologists and school psychologists. The cooperative also assists recruits and staff with the costs of training. James River Cooperative sponsors speech traineeships in an effort to continue to fill Speech Language Pathologist positions that become available in its member districts and participates in the Resident Teacher recruitment program.

During the 2019-2020 school year, the Multi-Tiered System of Support- Academics (MTSS-A) continued implementation in grades K-12. JRSEC administration and teachers supported the district Multi-Tiered System of Support- Academics (MTSS-A). The district implemented Reading Mastery, Corrective Reading and Connecting Math Concepts at the elementary level, which are programs designed for students that struggle in reading and/or math. The middle school implemented Corrective Reading, Trans-Math and Connecting Math Concepts which were added to the already existing Language! interventions. The high school maintained Read 180 and implemented Trans-Math. Data collection for all students was enhanced with the Fast Bridge data collection system. The Multi-Tiered System of Support- Behavior (MTSS-B) team met and piloted a social emotional curriculum at the elementary level. Some special education staff at the middle school level also taught MTSS intervention course work focused on reading and math.

JRSEC continues to focus training efforts for a broader range of staff on strategies that are effective for students with social, emotional, behavioral, social communication and mental health concerns. Training efforts have focused on self-regulation skills, social thinking and Nurtured Heart for the past several years.

JRSEC participates in a variety of monitoring activities each year as directed by the Department of Public Instruction (DPI). JRSEC also reports on various Indicators and each individual school district superintendent receives notification on whether indicators have met requirements. The Jamestown Special Education Unit was focused monitored through DPI and are working on providing professional develop to staff going forward related to dropout prevention, mentorship and student/family engagement.

During the 2019-2020 school year, JRSEC staff focused on the following goals: 1) Staff continued to utilize Zones of Regulation and mental health being a priority. 2) Each special education teacher who supervises a para educator will develop a plan to improve communication between said teacher and his/her para educator and training on student specific needs. Prior goals that have become expectations for the Cooperative: 1) Include baseline data in all IEPs. 2) Involve students, grades 5 and up, as active participants at their IEP meetings. 3) By the end of the first week of school and within one week of the IEP meeting, provide pertinent information to all involved general education teachers and administrator(s). 4) Share the progress monitoring graphs with the IEP team members, with an explanation of the data provided. 5) Provide parents with written progress reports four times per year with progress monitoring graphs one time being at the annual IEP.

The Transition House, the district's program for 18-21 year olds who have met all graduation requirements, continues to successfully manage its own coffee business, The Magic Bean. The Transition House students have also expanded The Magic Bean to provide catering services throughout the community. The JRSEC Director and Jamestown High School Principal submitted two proposals to Vocational Rehabilitation with intent to enhance opportunities for students with disabilities in job exploration, work-based learning, workplace readiness training and instruction in self-advocacy.

#### JAMES VALLEY CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY CENTER

James Valley Career & Technology Center is an Area Center that provides courses to the following schools: Jamestown, Montpelier, and Gackle. Each member district has a representative on the advisory board, which meets both in the fall and spring. The Jamestown Public School District Board is the operating board for the center. Operating costs are shared by the cooperating districts and consist of local, state and federal funds. The total enrollment of students who attended class at the James Valley Career and Technology Center was 369 during semester 1 and 309 during semester 2. The enrollment for the Business Education and the Family and Consumer Science classes housed at the high school are not included in the previous count. In February, we opened discussions with Medina Public Schools to see if they would be interested in joining the consortium, and they would like to discuss that model further next fall.

The Career Guidance Counselor provides full- school day services to Montpelier on Mondays and Gackle on Thrusdays. This same position serves the JVCTC on Tuesdays and Wednesday, while extending service to Jamestown North on Fridays. Extra-curricular activities at the Center include, FFA (intra-curricular part of the Agriculture Education Program), Skills USA (intra curricular part of the Auto Mechanics, Auto Collision, Health Careers, Construction Technology, Machine Tooling) and DECCA through Marketing.

The JVCTC formed a network with industry partners to put school district land into production through a land grant. The Soil Conservation Service, Cenex, Ag Country and local ag leaders partnered in seeding 25 acres into Rye as a cover crop last fall. In addition, we will build test plots of beans and corn from a variety of seeds, so Ag and science students can study the maturation of each crop. Students will also conduct soil testing experiments to study how the soil could have impacted the growth of each test plot. The remaining school acres in the area will be seeded to alfalfa, and the FFA will sell the bails to generate funding to support the club.

The JVCTC wrote and received to SAND grants last fall. The revenue generated from this award was used to enhance the areas of FACS and Building Trades. We purchased an ADA compliant oven-stove combination to meet the needs of our students in special populations and we were able to purchase an additional refrigerator to meet the needs of our expanding FACS program. In addition, our Building Trades program used its portion of the proceeds to build a 16' permanent compound miter saw stand complete with a self-contained dust collection system which aided our students who struggle with allergies.

The JVCTC completed its 5-year program evaluation this fall. A team of NDCTE officers, site directors, and program evaluators studied our program areas and identified areas of strength, while also making recommendations in key areas. All recommendations were met and evidence was provided to the state office, demonstrating the JVCTC was in compliance with the required changes. Assistant Superintendent of the North Dakota Career and Technology Education Department presented the team's evaluation to the Jamestown Public Schools School Board.

The JVCTC hosted tours and events this spring in an attempt to generate interest in CTE related fields. This included 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade tours in which each instructor had an opportunity to showcase some units of study in each respected curricular area. Moreover, the center hosted the first annual "Entrepreneur Day." Every JHS freshman was able to listen to local business leaders share their individual anecdotes as to how they forged a pathway to success in each respected area.

With the intent of expanding program offerings, the JVCTC constructed a pathway for students to enroll in Market 1 at the start of the 2021-2022 school year. Those interested will be required to complete the prerequisite course of *Principles to Marketing* in conjunction with *Sports and Entertainment Marketing*. Moreover, the center grew in the area of dual credit offerings which will allow medical students the opportunity to complete an RN degree in two years. Those online dual credit offerings include online *Composition 110/120* and *Psychology 111/250*. Those same course offerings also benefit students pursuing a physical therapy major or occupational therapy major.

Due to the Covid-19 Crises this year, Jamestown Public Schools developed a state-approved plan which enabled our district to provide virtual and distance learning opportunities to students. JHS and JVCTC instructors provided synchronous and a-synchronous opportunities through virtual education via the Google Classroom Learning Management System. Teachers also set up office hours so students could access them in the event they needed direct assistance. Teacher, guidance staff, and administrative officials combined, produced over 4,500 log entries, which represented the number of times students were contacted in regards to academic performance. The Covid-19 crises also prevented our extra-curricular groups from participating in state conventions and competitions.

#### ADULT BASIC EDUCATION/ADULT LEARNING CENTER

The Adult Learning Centers went to a grant bid system, in the Spring of 2017 and JVCTC did not receive the grant. Sheyenne Valley Career & Tech Center received the grant and organized a satellite center in Jamestown, which is located in the JVCTC. Some students will return after June 1 to complete preparation work prior to taking their GED assessments.

#### ADULT FARM BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

Farm Business Management offers programs to educate area farmers and ranchers for the betterment of their farm operations. Much of this education is on an individualized "one-on-one" basis. Group informational meetings and small group discussion classes are also utilized. Coordinator is Jason Fewell. He also serves as facilitator for area agriculture marketing clubs The State Board for Career/Technology and enrollee tuition fund the program.

#### CARL PERKINS II FUNDS

The James Valley Career and Technology Center receives Carl Perkins Act V Funds. The funds are part of the federal funds paid to the Center from the State Department of Career & Technical Education. The Carl Perkins V funds are allocated to the James Valley Career and Technology Center because of the James Valley Consortium. The Center functions as the fiscal agent for this Consortium. All Perkins purchases are pre-approved by the state office, and the center provides vouchers and receipts to the state as evidence of purchases. In addition, all items are inventoried before released to individual instructors.

The funding of next year's programs will be impacted by the results of the JVCTC Local Comprehensive Needs Assessment. This document will reveal job trends and demands which related directly to program offerings.

#### PEARSON VUE AND ASE TEST SITE

The James Valley Career and Technology Center is a Test site for Pearson Vue and

Prometric, which runs ASE testing. ASE testing is for Automotive Tech and Automotive

Collision certification and re-certification testing. Pearson Vue is in charge of GED testing in

North Dakota and testing in over a hundred different areas. The Center has done testing in the

Following areas: EMT, CISCO, Exercise Science, Computer, TV Technician and many more.

The Center averages about 1-2 testers per week. Darby Heinert is the chief examiner for the Test Site.

#### TITLE I – REMEDIAL READING & MATH

Jamestown Public School's Title I program includes remedial reading and math for students at Washington, Roosevelt, Lincoln, Louis L'Amour and St. John's Academy.

#### TITLE II A – TEACHER QUALITY

The District utilizes these funds for professional development activities during the year. Some of the professional development opportunities for principals and teachers include, Marzano Evaluation, AdvancED Math and PBL. This grant also provides payment for substitute teachers when teachers attend training. Due to COVID, travel to conferences was limited.

#### TITLE IV – SAFE & HEALTHY, WELL ROUNDED, TECHNOLOGY

The Title IV funding is to meet the needs in the area of safety and wellness along with providing students a well-rounded education with opportunities in the area of technology. The District used these funds during 2019-2020 to provide Edgenuity licenses, Fitness Grams, Flex Schedule Software, 7 Mindsets, Safe Schools. Counseling curriculum and additional counseling time is also funded through Title IV. School closing in Mach because of the pandemic also limited some of these expenditures.

#### MIDDLE SCHOOL-ALTERNATIVE PROGRAM

The Middle School Alternative Program Is targeted for "at risk" students in grades 6-8. The Alternative Program teaching staff consists of one classroom teacher qualified in special education, a social worker, and a teacher assistant. The Alternative Program staff works very closely with the regular education teachers. The social worker provides social skills for the students along with working closely with the parents to develop skills to foster parent interventions.

The students follow the same curriculum as students in the regular education classroom with modifications to meet their individual needs. Following the standard curriculum aligns with the goal of this program to transition the student back into regular education classroom within a 90 school day period. The Middle School Alternative Program is a program based on individualized learning that can provide each student with success at his/her appropriate level. The program focuses on individual goals to improve academics, social skills, and independence. The program also focuses on increased communication with the family support unit to further the emphasis of academics and other specific goals that will lead to student success. This program allows for much more individualized instruction with emphasis on individual growth. The key for the success of the program has been the partnerships with the regular education staff and other agencies. The program has taken students who were unsuccessful in a traditional approach into a more structured environment, and in many cases if it weren't for the program, these students would have dropped out of school. The Alternative Program is located at the Jamestown Middle School.

The Middle School Alternative Program has also become an avenue for providing instruction to individual students who have been temporarily removed from the classroom or the general school population for disciplinary or academic reasons.

#### JAMESTOWN Hub – ALTERNATIVE PROGRAM

The spring of 2020 Jamestown North moved from their separate building on the campus to the High School building. The name changed to Jamestown Hub.

Jamestown Hub enrolls students between the ages of 16-21 who have left high school. The total number of students who attended the Hub at various times during the 2019-20 school year was 35. The Jamestown Hub program had 6 students complete graduation requirements in 2019-20.

The Hub teachers are also serving students from the regular setting by offering credit recovery and initial courses. This year, there were approximately 55 students who took advantage of taking one hour courses with the Hub teachers.

#### TRANSITION LEARNING SERVICES PROGRAM

The Jamestown High School (JHS) Transition Program is designed for individuals with moderate to severe disabilities that have met all graduation requirements, but continue to need support and education in the areas of work place readiness, on the job training and independent living skills. Students are able to access services until the age of 21, as specified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The program is currently located in a residential home owned by the Jamestown Public Schools near Lincoln Elementary School, but is in the process of moving to the Jamestown North building located on the Jamestown High School campus. Students are assessed for specific skills in the areas of vocational and independent living skills. A team of teachers, along with the student and parent, develop educational plans to identify preferences and strengthen, recreation and leisure skills. The Transition Program continues to manage a coffee business, The Magic Bean, and has expanded the service to include catering. Many people, in the schools and community, have been able to enjoy the services the Magic Bean provides while students learn valuable work readiness, money management and social skills.

#### TAI FNTFD AND GIFTFD PROGRAM

The Talented and Gifted (TAG) program was brought back to the district in the fall of 2010 with two full-time teachers. Jamestown Public elementary schools had 83 students participate in the program from grades second through fifth. The program is designed as a full pull-out program in their respective schools. The gifted and talented teachers are continually improving the identification process to enter students into the program. To identify students for the program the TAG teachers analyze student FAST scores, have classroom teachers fill out the Scales for Rating the Behavioral Characteristics of Superior Students survey, work with recommended students, and look at examples of student work. A student can qualify for TAG services in either reading or math or a combination of both. These students meet in small group settings with the focus on reading and math acceleration and enrichment. Classes also participate in activities such as science experiments and programming computers. Along with academic standards, classes focus on problem-solving, creative thinking, social/emotional, and independent inquiry/research skills. TAG teachers also work with all grade level classroom teachers to give ideas and activities for differentiation in regular classrooms. At the beginning of the year TAG teachers give an in-service to parents describing the program. At the end of the year the TAG teachers have an open house to show off student projects and let students and parents participate in exciting activities.

This year the TAG program added project based learning lessons and Hands-On Fractions to our curriculum. At the end of the year the TAG program teachers were utilized in a variety of different ways to reach students during the Covid pandemic. From planning to holding friendship groups at school to keep students accountable, the TAG program changed for the remainder of the school year.

The preschool special needs program plays an active role in the lives of our young children. The program, along with the preschool special needs classroom, provides early intervention in a variety of ways when eligibility criteria are met and special education services are required. During 2019-2020 the preschool special needs program provided services to 37 preschoolers in the areas of Occupational therapy, Physical therapy, Educational support services (behavior support included), and Speech services.

#### 2019-2020 Preschool program highlights include the following:

- 1. Fifty-five children were referred for services. (A detailed breakdown of Jamestown referrals is included in Figure 1.)
- 2. The preschool program utilizes the North Dakota Early Learning Standards.
- 3. Education Software for Guiding Instruction pre-test administered to preschoolers attending the special needs classroom.
- 4. Baseline and progress monitoring data 4 times a year and graphing on each of the goals presented at the annual IEP meeting.
- 5. Preschool team member(s) attended approximately 145 meetings regarding preschool age children.
- 6. Preschool staff has implemented PECs, picture exchange communication system, Zoo-phonics to enhance language arts and pre-reading skills, Read It Again curriculum promoting language and literacy foundations, Nurtured Heart Approach, Zones of Regulation and Social Thinking activities.
- 7. Due to COVID-19 the preschool staff did not have the opportunity to attend the Early Childhood or Speech Conferences.
- 8. Due to COVID-19 preschool staff developed 37 contingency plans that involved a weekly contact with parent(s). Preschool activity packets were developed and delivered to the family home bi-weekly.
- 9. During the mandated school closure, the preschool team continued to have 13 Part C to B transition meetings virtually enabling both entities to remain compliant with mandatory timelines.
- 10. Preschool coordinator serves on the DPI Early Childhood Special Education Advisory Committee.
- 11. The preschool team administered (8) entry and (14) exit Battelle Developmental Inventories (anchor tool used for North Dakota Early Childhood Outcomes project).
- 12. The preschool team administered: Dial (3) entry/child find screenings, (1) exit (DIAL-4 anchor tool used for North Dakota Early Childhood Outcomes project articulation only), (4) speech observations and (2) behavioral observations by school psychologist.
- 13. Seventeen preschoolers will transition to kindergarten, fall of 2020.
- 14. Projected preschool special needs enrollment for fall 2020: 27 preschoolers
  - Classroom starting AM session: (6) preschoolers
  - Classroom starting PM session: (4) preschoolers
  - In addition, (17) preschoolers to receive services outside of the classroom.
  - Due to COVID-19 and June Part C to B referrals in progress possible eligibility of (9) additional preschoolers. Breakdown of possible categories (6) speech, (2) NCD and (1) OHI.

#### TRANSITION BUSING

Jamestown Public Schools contracts with Dietrich Bus Service Inc. from Valley City to provide daily bussing needs of transporting students to and from school each day. Busses pick up students in a designated part of town or in the rural community, and then they all meet at the High School, which is our transition point. Students most likely get off the bus that brought them into town and board another bus which is designated for the school they attend.
