A confinement feeding operation structure<sup>1</sup> is abandoned if the confinement feeding operation structure<sup>1</sup> has been razed, removed from the site of a confinement feeding operation, filled in with earth, or converted to uses other than a confinement feeding operation structure<sup>1</sup> so that it cannot be used as a confinement feeding operation structure<sup>1</sup> without significant reconstruction. #### Policy

- 1. Employment status Ambulance Service: Non Full-time.
- 2. Non Full-time staff will be required to work a minimum number of hours each two consecutive pay periods.
- 3. The initial "two" consecutive pay period block for implementation of this policy will be May 4, 2022 (May 4, 2022 through May 17, 2022). And <u>continue</u> with each following two consecutive pay period block.
- 4. Non Full-time employees will be required to work a <u>minimum</u> of <u>24 hours</u> over the two pay period block.
- 5. Exemption to this policy may be granted for unforeseen obligations and scheduled events (full-time job requirements, military duty, vacations, etc.). The Ambulance Director must be notified in advance of these obligations/events.
- 6. Emergency exemptions may be granted provided that the Ambulance Director is notified as soon as reasonably possible of the emergency.
- 7. Hours scheduled and called off will not be considered as hours worked, unless approved as in "5" or "6" above.

This Agreement, is entered into by and between the Iowa Department of Transportation, hereinafter designated the "DOT", and Washington County, Iowa, a Local Public Agency, hereafter designated the "LPA" in accordance with Iowa Code Chapters 28E, 306, 306A and 313.4 as applicable:

The DOT proposes to establish or make improvements to Iowa 1 within Washington County, Iowa; and

The DOT and the LPA are willing to jointly participate in said project, in the manner hereinafter provided; and

This Agreement reflects the current concept of this project which is subject to modification by mutual agreement between the LPA and the DOT; and

Therefore, it is agreed as follows:

#### 1. Project Information

a. The DOT will design, let, and inspect construction of the following described project in accordance with the project plans and DOT standard specifications:

Portland cement concrete (PCC) paving and grading on Iowa 1, from the Keokuk County line to the west city limits of Brighton within Washington County. The project includes 4 foot wide paved shoulders.

- b. As part of the project, the LPA has requested that two existing gravel side road junctions are to be paved with 9.5 inches of PCC pavement for a distance of approximately 50 feet from the outside edge of the proposed 4 foot wide paved roadway shoulder all at no cost to the DOT. (See Exhibit A for location and Exhibit B for costs).
- c. Paving of granular secondary road approaches beyond 4 feet from the edge of the primary road pavement shall be 100% LPA cost based on the estimated quantities as shown on Exhibit B.

#### 2. Project Costs

- a. The LPA shall reimburse the DOT for its share of the project costs estimated at \$45,700, as shown in Exhibit B. The amount paid by the LPA upon completion of construction and proper billing by the DOT will be determined by the actual quantities in place and the accepted bid at the contract letting.
- b. The DOT will bear all costs except those allocated to the LPA under other terms of this Agreement.

#### 3. Traffic Control

a. The DOT will temporarily close the highway project area by formal action in accord with lowa Code section 306.41. Iowa 1 through-traffic will be detoured off of the project. The LPA will authorize the



DOT to erect and maintain signs within its jurisdiction, consistent with Part 6 of the "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices", as necessary to direct traffic to and along said detour route during the construction period. The DOT will also remove said signs when the detour is discontinued. Details will be shown on the traffic control sheet(s) within the project plans. A separate detour agreement will be negotiated and the LPA will be eligible for compensation for the detour in accordance with the DOT Detour Policy.

- b. If it becomes necessary to temporarily close LPA side roads during construction, the DOT will furnish and install the required barricades and signing for the closure at project cost and shall remove same upon completion of the project also at no expense or obligation to the LPA. The DOT will work in close cooperation with the LPA and the contractor to accommodate emergency services and local access across the project during construction. Any detours which may be necessary for project related LPA road closures will be the responsibility of the LPA all at no expense or obligation to the DOT.
- c. If this project causes the temporary closure of a road during construction, the DOT shall meet with the LPA to determine whether said closure(s) will cause increased traffic on other LPA roads. The DOT and the LPA shall determine a plan, and the costs thereof, for the LPA to perform dust control on said LPA roads with increased traffic, should dust control become necessary. In that event, the LPA shall inform the DOT prior to performing said dust control. The DOT shall reimburse the LPA for the cost of said dust control measures following the receipt of a bill for the agreed upon costs (see Iowa Code section 313.4 subsection 1.b.).

#### 4. Right of Way and Permits

 The DOT will be responsible for the coordination of utility facility adjustments for the primary road project.

#### 5. Construction & Maintenance

- a. Upon completion of the project, no changes in the physical features thereof will be undertaken or permitted without the prior written approval of the DOT.
- b. Future maintenance of the primary highway within the project area will be carried out in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in Instructional Memorandum 7.110.


#### 6. General Provisions

- a. If the LPA has completed a Flood Insurance Study (FIS) for an area which is affected by the proposed Primary Highway project and the FIS is modified, amended or revised in an area affected by the project after the date of this Agreement, the LPA shall promptly provide notice of the modification, amendment or revision to the DOT. If the LPA does not have a detailed Flood Insurance Study (FIS) for an area which is affected by the proposed Primary Highway project and the LPA does adopt an FIS in an area affected by the project after the date of this Agreement, the LPA shall promptly provide notice of the FIS to the DOT.
- b. The LPA will comply with all provisions of the equal employment opportunity requirements prohibiting discrimination and requiring affirmative action to assure equal employment opportunity as required by lowa Code Chapter 216. No person will, on the grounds of age, race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, religion, pregnancy, or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which State funds are used.

- c. It is the intent of both parties that no third party beneficiaries be created by this Agreement.
- d. If any section, provision, or part of this Agreement shall be found to be invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect the validity of the Agreement as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not found to be invalid or unconstitutional, except to the extent that the original intent of the Agreement cannot be fulfilled.
- e. This Agreement may be executed in (two) counterparts, each of which so executed will be deemed to be an original.
- f. This Agreement, as well as the unaffected provisions of any previous agreement(s), addendum(s), and/or amendment(s); represents the entire Agreement between the LPA and DOT regarding this project. All previously executed agreements will remain in effect except as amended herein. Any subsequent change or modification to the terms of this Agreement will be in the form of a duly executed amendment to this document.


