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## ROAD PATROL OVERVIEW

### Operational Highlights

#### Task Force Activity

The Midwest Missouri Career Criminal and Drug Task Force had an active month, partnering with Henry County deputies to address narcotics activity and criminal enforcement across the region.

- Henry County hosted a traffic saturation detail with multiple task force members participating. The joint effort resulted in several narcotics-related investigations, traffic stops, and intelligence gathering operations.
- In addition, Henry County Task Force Members responded to Cedar County to assist with multiple search warrants related to ongoing investigations.
- This collaborative partnership continues to strengthen investigative capabilities and enhance public safety across multiple jurisdictions. The task force remains a valuable asset for all agencies involved.

#### Community Engagement

The Sheriff's Office continues to prioritize positive community relationships and outreach. During November, deputies participated in several community events including:

- Christmas Parades in Clinton, Montrose, and Windsor, where deputies assisted with traffic control and participated in festivities.
- Deepwater Turkey Shoot, a well-attended local event promoting community fellowship and engagement with law enforcement.
- Clinton Cougar 4-H Club Tour, where members visited the Sheriff's Office for an educational and interactive tour to learn about law enforcement operations and community service.

These engagements continue to strengthen trust and communication between the Sheriff's Office and the citizens we serve.

#### Summary

The Henry County Sheriff's Office remains focused on proactive enforcement, community collaboration, and inter-agency partnerships. The continued dedication of our deputies, task force members, and support staff ensures a high level of service and safety for Henry County residents and our contract municipalities.

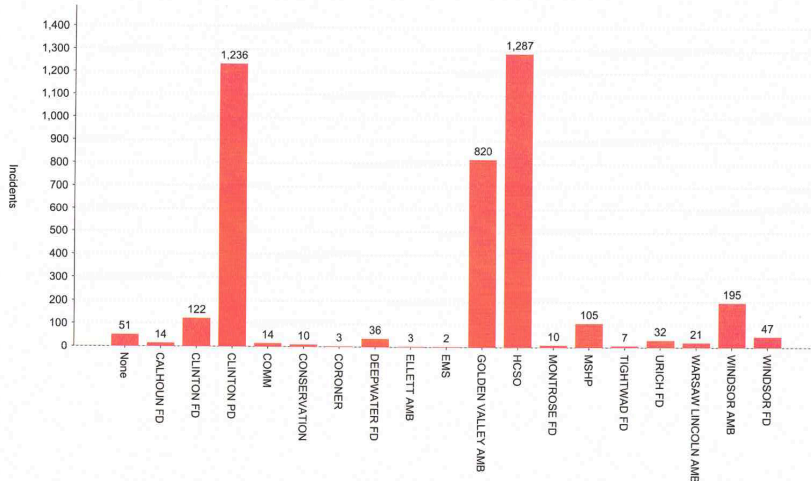

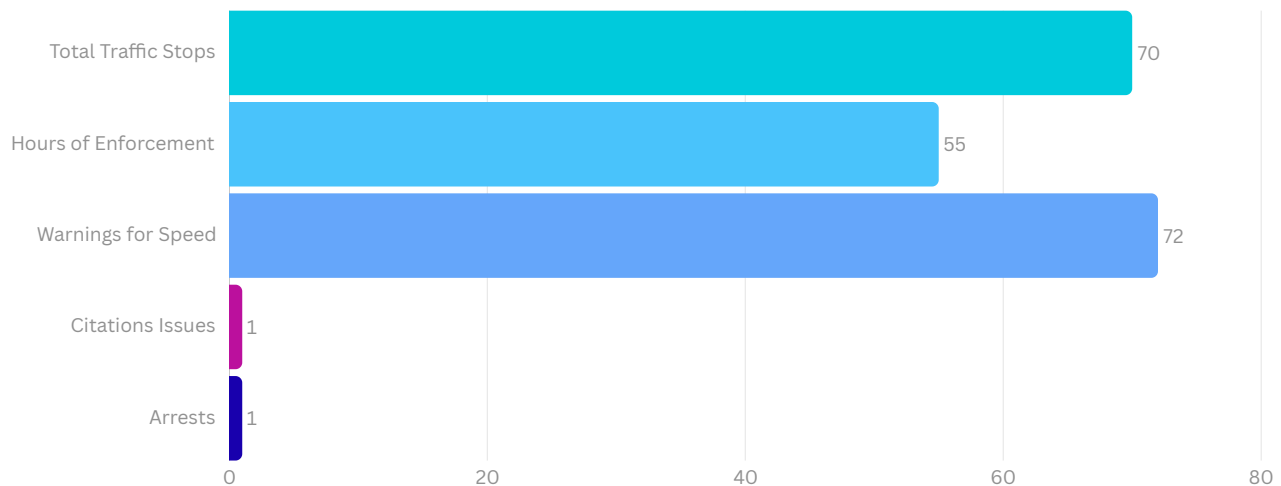

## SPECIALIZED TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT



The Henry County Sheriff's Office conducted specialized traffic enforcement efforts targeting hazardous moving violations, particularly during high-traffic periods. These efforts focused on state-maintained highways that see heavy use by commuters, school staff, and students, including MO-Highway 7, MO-Highway 52, MO-Highway 18, MO-Highway 2, and MO-Highway 23.

These efforts resulted in 1 citation (for no driver's license), along with 72 warnings issued for various violations ranging from speeding, signal light violations to hazardous moving violations.

Looking at the broader picture, our year-to-date totals through (Jan-Sept 2025) included 885 total traffic stops, 560 hours of enforcement, 71 citations, 841 warnings, and 15 arrests.

The Henry County Sheriff's Office remains committed to enhancing roadway safety through consistent and visible enforcement of traffic laws. Special emphasis will continue to be placed on school zones and major commuter routes, with the goal of reducing traffic crashes, injuries, and fatalities. These proactive measures are an essential part of our ongoing mission to protect the citizens of Henry County.

This initiative was supported by a Missouri Department of Transportation grant, reinforcing our commitment to reducing traffic-related injuries and fatalities. Moving forward, the Henry County Sheriff's Office will continue strategic enforcement efforts throughout 2025, ensuring that our roads remain safe for all residents.

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# MONTHLY TRAINING SUMMARY

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## **Monthly Training Summary – November 2025**

The Henry County Sheriff's Office continued its strong commitment to professional development and community partnership throughout November. Training remains a top priority for our agency, strengthening staff readiness, enhancing public safety, and reinforcing collaborative relationships with schools, churches, and community organizations across Henry County.

### **In-House Training & Professional Development**

The Missouri Sheriffs' Association Training Academy continued operating at HCSO, delivering 61 hours of instruction in November across a wide range of law enforcement topics, including criminal investigations, crime scene processing, death investigations, interrogation techniques, report writing, and physical training. Instruction was provided by personnel from HCSO and surrounding sheriff's offices, with POST certification awarded upon program completion in May 2026. Eight additional hours of testing were conducted, including specialized SFST examinations.

HCSO also hosted the Instructor Development School, providing 40 hours of training to five instructor candidates. Upon certification, these instructors will strengthen HCSO's long-term training capacity by allowing more frequent and specialized in-house instruction. Mandatory firearms marksmanship and manipulation training was completed by all armed staff, reinforcing safety, proficiency, and operational readiness.

Several staff members attended specialized external training, including Death Investigation Training and the Upstream Youth Prevention & Intervention Workshop, which focused on early intervention strategies and cross-agency collaboration to improve youth outcomes across the judicial circuit.

### **Community Training & Partnerships**

Community-based training remains a cornerstone of public safety in Henry County. In November, HCSO conducted ALICE Active Assailant Awareness Training for the Leesville R-9 School District and provided Church Safety & Security Training for local congregations. These sessions equip community members with practical tools for emergency preparedness while strengthening trust and partnerships.

### **Why Training Matters**

Ongoing training ensures deputies and staff remain prepared, confident, and aligned with professional standards. For the community, it fosters transparency, preparedness, and collaboration—empowering residents, educators, and faith leaders to play an active role in public safety.

### **Month in Review**

November was a productive month of training, instruction, and collaboration. Through continued investment in staff development and community engagement, the Henry County Sheriff's Office remains committed to excellence, preparedness, and partnership—because a well-trained agency and an informed community are essential to a safe and thriving Henry County.

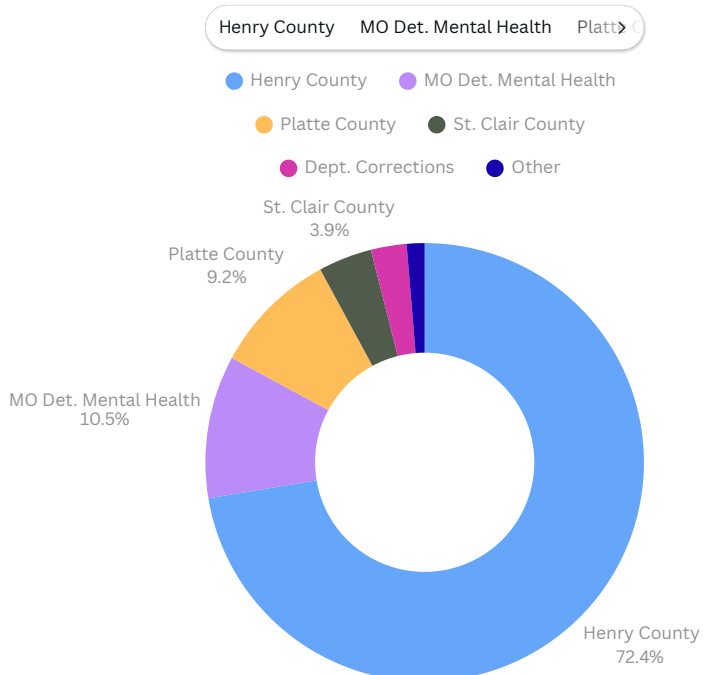
# CORRECTIONS

The Average Daily Population (ADP) for November was 92, with a census of 77 inmates as of December 1, continuing the seasonal decline typically seen during the holidays. Missouri Department of Mental Health (DMH) holds decreased to approximately 6% of the jail population, down from 8% in October. Notably, one long-term DMH hold was transferred after 313 days, and another placement was secured after 106 days with assistance from the Henry County Public Administrator. Court-ordered inmates awaiting DMH evaluations continue to account for 3–4% of the ADP. We continue to assist regional partners by housing two inmates for Platte County and maintaining a five-bed contract with St. Clair County, with additional bunk space offered as capacity allows.

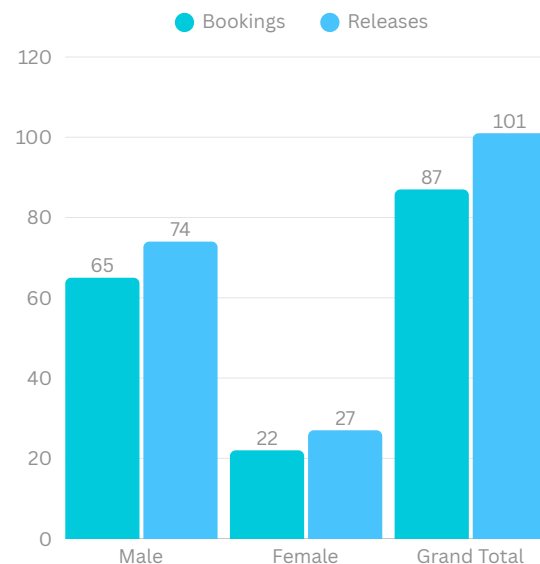
Facility maintenance remains an ongoing priority. Recent improvements included re-caulking exterior joints and repainting exterior doors to preserve the building's longevity, along with repairs to padded areas and replacement planning for kitchen equipment. These upgrades occur alongside the daily operational demands of maintaining a safe and functional detention facility.

Looking ahead, academy cadets continue balancing training and jail assignments, which remains a scheduling challenge. The jail is fully staffed, and recent command structure updates—including the appointment of a Jail Sergeant, creation of a Support Resource Officer position, and supervisory promotions—will continue to impact operations as staff transition into new roles. Two staff members completed 32 hours of training in advanced jail management software and legal instruction through the National Institute of Jail Operations (NIJO).

# COURT SECURITY

The Henry County Courthouse, a historic landmark in Clinton, Missouri, serves as the central hub for the county's judicial proceedings. Within its walls, the courthouse accommodates both the Associate Circuit Court and the Circuit Court, each handling a distinct array of cases to ensure comprehensive justice for the community.

To maintain a secure and orderly environment, the Henry County Sheriff's Office has appointed three full-time bailiffs. These dedicated officers are responsible for overseeing security checkpoints, managing courtroom activities, and ensuring the safety of judges, staff, and the numerous visitors who pass through the courthouse daily. Their presence is especially crucial given the high volume of jury trials and the significant public engagement within our beautiful courthouse.

The courthouse itself is a testament to architectural elegance, featuring multiple levels dedicated to various judicial functions. There are four levels in use, with a third courtroom in the basement to accommodate the growing demands of our judicial system.

The collaborative efforts of our bailiffs, court staff, and the Sheriff's Office exemplify our dedication to upholding the integrity of the judicial process while ensuring the safety and well-being of all who enter the courthouse. As we continue to experience an increase in jury trials and public participation, these measures are vital in maintaining the esteemed reputation of our county's judicial system.
