Children's Home Society names Karl Jegeris as Director of Collaborative Excellence

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (June 3, 2020) – Children's Home Society (CHS) has appointed Karl Jegeris as its Director of Collaborative Excellence. This is a new position for CHS that will provide leadership and guidance in the areas of strategy, program development, and enhanced client outcomes.

Jegeris comes to CHS from the Rapid City Police Department where he has served for 24 years, most recently as Chief of Police. In that role, he led initiatives that met the needs of the community, built and strengthened relationships with community partners, and worked to improve the quality of life for the citizens of Rapid City.

Providing support to operational leadership in the development and execution of strategy will be one of Jegeris' main priorities. He will also work closely with program leaders to increase organizational efficiency and continuously improve program outcomes.

"Karl brings with him skills and experience that will be tremendous assets to Children's Home as we move into the future. Jegeris has a Master's Degree in Public Safety Executive Leadership where his studies focused on advanced leadership skills, budgeting, planning and leading organizational change, human resource management, and research analysis. He has served on many boards and has received accolades through his career including being the 2015 recipient of the Rapid City Chamber of Commerce "Wind Beneath our Wings" Outstanding Performance Award, recognizing unselfish and noble actions. He was also named "Outstanding Public Servant" by Western Dakota Technical Institute in 2018.

"The trauma-informed services CHS provides are critical to restore safety and hope to so many special children, women, and families throughout South Dakota," said Jegeris. "I am excited to be joining such a compassionate and tenacious team, and look forward to continuing serving others through this position."

Jegeris will office primarily at the CHS campus in the Black Hills, and he will be regularly serving at the Sioux Falls locations as well.
