

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Outdoor Leadership Capstone Voyage

This year, the capstone class project for PWSC outdoor leadership students is a 14-day kayak trip from Whittier to Valdez. According to Dr. Benjamin Rush, Assistant Professor of Outdoor Leadership, this is a student-planned and led expedition. Rush explained, "The students planned our route, prepared the equipment, and purchased over 385 pounds of food. They put a lot of time into the planning of this expedition. We'd like to give special thanks to Dan O'Connor, Shannon Stites, and Jay Stevens for making this happen. It's definitely a team effort."

To participate in this class, students have taken Alaska Backpacking, Wilderness First Responder, and Beginning Sea kayaking. Students will rely on the skills they have learned and acquired through their coursework.

PWSC Plays Well With Others

Did you know that Prince William Sound College (PWSC) and Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve partner to offer an internship program that helps students and the community?

Every summer, a PWSC Outdoor Leadership student has the opportunity to work closely with park staff to learn about park planning, interpretation of law and policy, and basic land management principles.

Joe Kay, a graduate of Prince William Sound College, was an intern in the program in the summer of 2020.

"We went out towards Slana in the North District of the park and conducted a condition assessment of an Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) trail," Kay said. "We were using a handheld Trimble GPS unit to collect condition data along the trail."

Kay now has a job as a lead guide with Alaska Guide Company, where he uses skills he developed as an intern including what it takes to maintain trails and appreciate the environment.

PWSC and the National Park Service (NPS) also work together throughout the year on local community initiatives with the college's Copper Basin Extension Center. This collaboration includes other local area governmental organizations, non-profits, and tribal organizations, and provides opportunities for youth and community members.

"We all care about this amazing place we call home," said Carrie Wittmer, the team lead for the Division of Interpretation & Education at Wrangell-St. Elias National Park and Preserve. "It takes work to keep this place beautiful, wild, and thriving. No one organization has the staff, money, or time to do everything that needs to be done. The way we get things done is by sharing ideas, working together, and leveraging the resources we can contribute."

Safety First



In PWSC's Introduction to Safety & Risk class this semester, students spent a couple of class periods learning about the safety and risk considerations of rappelling through student-led presentations. Rappelling is a fundamental technical outdoor skill, but one that has a history of accidents in the outdoor industry when not applied according to best practices. This learning experience was a follow-up to the students' recent Beginning Ice Climbing course, as rappelling is a future step in the students' learning progression to become competent and safe climbers.

In the first photo, instructor Mat Brunton discusses common anchor and rappelling errors that also transgress climbing ethics by causing unnecessary wear and tear on communal equipment like anchors and rappel rings.

In the second photo, students practice anchor and rappel setup, through trial and error, using limited materials.

He applied, interviewed, and visited the job site to see what it was all about. "It was good to visit the job site because I wasn't sure what I was getting into, and it was great! Everyone treats you like a family member and I like that."
