



Leveraging Technology for Enhanced Service

The department uses *Sensus* auto read meters which allows for remote access to assist with billing and troubleshooting. Plans are underway to implement *Ally Meters* featuring remote shut off and turn on capabilities, as well as other remote features. *FieldHawk* 2.0 has been implemented to enable remote, paperless work orders.

2024 Tornado

May 26th Tornado - FEMA arrived and declared Baxter County a disaster. The Street Department was out the day after, clearing streets of fallen trees and limbs. A burn permit was acquired from ADEQ, and the Street Department began their limb pickup on June 3, finishing on July 10th with brush total of 2,534 cubic yards hauled. Reports were submitted to FEMA and the city will receive 75% of the total costs incurred.
